



### READ ANY GRAPHIC NOVELS LATELY?

If you have, you probably know that graphic novels, once considered the domain of kids and teens, have grown up and gone mainstream. Learn more about this fascinating, growing genre in this year's Adult Summer Reading Program, PICTURE THIS: EXPLORING GRAPHIC NOVELS.

The Thomas Ford Library has a wide selection of graphic novels that will appeal to adults. You can choose from history, romance, mystery, humor, business, cooking, memoir, fantasy, and literary fiction, as well as the action stories and manga that are typically associated with the genre. Or, if you prefer, you can choose to read anything related to the field of comics or their creators.

To participate, come into the Library beginning Monday, June 9, and sign up at the Reference Desk, where you'll receive a reading log. Or you can sign up and record your books online at www.fordlibrary.org. Over the course of the summer, check out six books, eBooks, or audiobooks. All are your choice, and ONLY ONE NEEDS TO BE A GRAPHIC NOVEL. Lists will be available in the Library to help you find something that you will enjoy!

For every item on your log, you will receive a ticket to enter drawings for some outstanding prizes—gift cards for Western Springs businesses, Vie restaurant, or tickets to the Theatre of Western Springs. EVERYONE who finishes 6 books will receive a Library tote bag.

Earn bonus tickets by writing reviews, telling us which book was your favorite, and turning in your log at the end. All tickets will remain in the drawing box all summer long, so report your books as soon as you finish them to increase your chances to win! Drawings will be held on June 27 and July 25, with the grand prize drawing at the end. The last day to enter the final drawing will be Saturday, August 23.


