

The Board of Trustees is composed of seven members who are elected to four-year terms. To serve, candidates must live in the village of Western Springs and be of voting age. Their responsibilities include selecting and hiring a qualified Library Director; ensuring that the Library has funds and a budget; developing (with the Library Director) written policies, long-and short-range plans, and wage classifications; and attending monthly Board meetings and other events. Board meetings, usually held at 7 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of the month, are open to the public.
