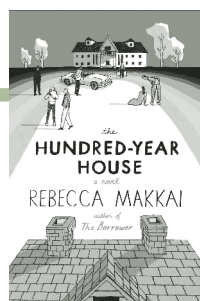
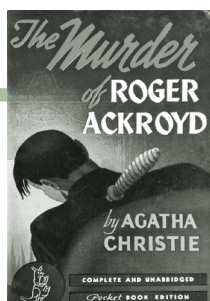

Coming this April!

Thomas Ford Memorial Library, and the other 76 libraries in the SWAN library network, are gearing up for the April switchover to the new Symphony Integrated Library System and the online catalog Enterprise. The catalog's new features will enhance the user experience and make things easier for those who regularly use the catalog.

Most importantly, the Enterprise catalog allows for intuitive searching, eBook integration, and online resources. Members will get recommended titles and receive results in the same way they expect from popular search engines. For eBook and audiobook lovers, this new catalog provides a seamless combination. Members can view their checked-out digital materials, search for all digital holdings in the catalog, and download these materials right from the catalog.

After the catalog goes live in April, this advanced system will integrate mobile apps and social media. With this dynamic experience, members can choose to receive phone, email, or text notifications of due dates, available holds, and more.

While the new system will be intuitive, members will also receive plenty of help through printed and online materials and from Library staff who will answer all your questions informally and during classes.
